### Actions/Strategies (from previous report)

- The Attendance Team will create a calendar of easy action steps for schools to support attendance – conferences, short weeks, holiday breaks, etc. with ready-made tools and communications to families.
- Partner with Communications around district wide attendance communication.

### What is Going Well

- 11 buildings have improved their chronic absenteeism by 10% or more from this same time last year.
- King has improved their chronic absenteeism by 20.6% compared to this time last year. Principal Renita Lord cited the following strategies:
  - Lots of communication through newsletters, signage, SnapCNXT, letters at conferences
  - Shout-outs to families regarding absentee data and the improvement
  - Lots of home visits
  - Teachers are faithful at calling after three days of absence. Celebrate with staff so they see the impact their phone calls make.
  - Whole building incentive that spells out ATTENDANCE. A letter is earned for every school day the building has 95% attendance. Students can see where they are every day. Once the word is earned, a school wide activity occurs (pajama day, hat day, party, etc.)
  - Students with a history of chronic tardiness have the opportunity to earn a Not Tardy Party. Parents and students are informed of the opportunity and the incentive.
  - Individual problem solving with families who are currently chronically absent or tardy.
- 4 buildings have less than 10% chronic absenteeism and 20/59 buildings are at 15% or less.
- Based on a month over month report, 57/59 buildings have decreased their chronic absenteeism from October 18 to November 18<sup>th</sup>, meaning there are students who were chronically absent in October who have now attended enough to no longer meet that designation.

### **What is Not Going Well**

- 8 of our schools have worse chronic absenteeism at this point than they did a year ago at this time.
- 6 buildings have more than 50% chronic absenteeism.
- As of this data report, 1,692 (5.5%) students have already missed 18 or more days of school, meaning they will not be able to recover their chronic absentee status this school year.

### **What's Next (Continued, Revised, New Actions)**

- The Attendance Team is providing building administrators with Tier I resources and suggestions via the Admin Updates Microsoft Team – Teaching and Learning Channel. These resources are provided at an intentional cadence with specific use suggestions.
- The Attendance Team continues to partner with Communications around time specific attendance messages based on upcoming school breaks.
- The Attendance Team is beginning to analyze the resources from Attendance Works to share with administrators to support Tier I attendance practices.
- The Attendance Team is connecting with buildings experiencing a significant decrease in chronic absenteeism to find out what they are doing to achieve their success.
